

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

A Get Into course will be open to young people who are work-ready and available to take up employment offers. The Course will focus on jobs and be driven by identified work opportunities within the area in which it is run and will provide an introduction to a specific work sector.

The Prince's Trust is a registered charity, incorporated BY Royal Charter in England and Wales (1079675) and Scotland (SC041198)

Get Into

The Prince's Trust's Get into programme was launched in 2005 when 17 young people from Glasgow took part in Get into Cooking.

In 2007 The Wood Foundation decided to start funding the programme which enabled The Prince's Trust to develop and grow the scheme across Scotland.


Since then over 2000 young people have taken part in the programme and it has grown to include 70 Get into courses in sectors including cooking, hospitality, the motor trade, engineering, retail, health & social care, security, facilities management, IT, oil and gas, logistics, construction and rural skills.

In the last financial year 650 young people came through the Get into programme, with three in four achieving positive outcomes and over half of them finding employment. This coming financial year The Prince's Trust is on target to run 70 courses and reach over 900 young people in Scotland.

Rachel CaseDirector, Regional Private Sector Fundraising

Rachel has been part of the Senior Fundraising Team at The Prince's Trust since July 2013 responsible for fundraising strategy and implementation. Rachel leads the 40 strong Regional Private Sector Team including the Scottish team. She is responsible for The Prince's Trust's regional income of around £10m and additionally a £3m budget of income raised through Trusts and Foundations. Working in partnership with a series of Regional Development Committees and the Scottish Council comprised of senior volunteers supporting the work of The Trust to help disadvantaged young people in the UK to change their lives and get into employment, education and training.

Rachel has over 20 years extensive fundraising experience in Senior roles at the NSPCC, Kids Company. She lives in North London with her husband and has four sons.



Caitlin Ross

With no home and no job, Caitlin found herself depressed – unrecognisable from the fun, bubbly person her friends knew. Now The Prince's Trust has helped her pave the way into a career in hospitality, with prospects around the world.

Caitlin, 23, had been all set for a college course in complimentary therapy, when illness struck and she lost her place.

"Some days I just didn't want to live," she says. "All the confidence I had drained out of me and I had no idea what to do."

Her luck changed when she mentioned to her Jobcentre advisor that she was enjoying volunteering in a kitchen at a day centre for people with mental health issues. The adviser suggested the Get into Hospitality course with The Prince's Trust, at Dumfries House Estate.

Caitlin, from Girvan in South Ayrshire, learned skills including preparing and serving food, pouring wine and planning a graduation dinner. She felt privileged to spend six days on work experience at the five-star Turnberry Hotel, and found her self-doubt falling away.

"Having people at The Prince's Trust believe in me gave me the push I needed to come out of my shell and realise things could get better for me after all. It was such a relief," she says.

Weeks later, the Turnberry Hotel invited her for interview and offered her a job as a switchboard operator with staff accommodation. She was overjoyed. In six months the hotel promoted her to receptionist, and she is now working towards opportunities in properties overseas.

"If it hadn't been for The Prince's Trust, I might still be down and out and looking for work. Now I'm always smiling and I'm proud to be me – I never thought I would ever say that again."

Amy Wilson

Amy, 17 slept up to 20 hours a day to escape the constant anxiety she felt. Since experiencing three separate sexual assaults on the bus home from school, she left the house only for therapy appointments.

Having left school, the thought of even doing the weekly shop with her mum filled her with fear and she only had distant memories of ever feeling happy and struggled to concentrate for more than 30 minutes at a time.

Amy says; "I was sad and exhausted every minute that I was awake," she says. "I didn't see the point in living anymore and had no motivation for anything. I became a prisoner in my own home, too anxious to go anywhere."

Then a career advisor told her about The Trust's Get into Beauty programme and despite her fears, Amy saw an opportunity.

At first, she was intimidated by the thought of being on a course with 11 other girls but quickly her warm, bright personality and passion for what she was doing shone through.

By the end of the course, Amy, had stopped relying on her mum to accompany her everywhere and was now taking the bus by herself. She enrolled at college and is now studying to become a beauty therapist, working a part time job and hoping one day to own her own salon".





Kerry Cheyne

Kerry's traumatic years in the care system left her feeling very vulnerable and alone. When she found herself unemployed, her hopes for her future were fading fast – until The Prince's Trust helped her into her dream job.

Although Kerry, 22, worked as a chef in a hotel for two years, the bus journey home late at night made her feel unsafe and she eventually had to leave.

Kerry's nerves in interviews seemed to keep her from her dream job – helping people with disabilities. Then she spotted a poster for The Trust's Get into Social Care programme and her life began to transform.

The four-week course, which was delivered with the charity Cornerstone, helps unemployed young people find a job in the care industry. For Kerry, the emotional support from The Prince's Trust staff and Cornerstone tutors kept her going through subject areas that brought difficult memories of her own past to the surface.

"They also built my confidence by telling me what I was good at and giving me praise. I hadn't been used to that," she says. "I realised I had new people in my life who wanted to help me."

Kerry, from Aberdeen, was chosen to present her story to a 70-strong audience, including her biological family. Battling to overcome the anxiety of speaking publically, she moved her audience to tears and was offered a job with Cornerstone the same day.

In more than a year as a support assistant, Kerry's empathy and ability to connect with others has made a deep impact. The people she cares for are noticeably delighted when they hear she is on shift.

As a Young Ambassador for The Prince's Trust, she has attended and spoken at many events around Scotland, inspiring people to support The Trust or join its programmes.

"The Prince's Trust has been phenomenal. There is no way I could thank them enough for what they've done for me, there are no words."

Nicole Gallagher

Nicole, 19, from Bishopbriggs, Glasgow faced a long search for work as she struggled to get a first foot on the career ladder.

While Nicole had worked in various jobs after studying make-up at college she was determined to create a rewarding and sustainable career for herself where there was real scope to learn and progress.

Nicole said: "I spent some time working for an accountants firm. It was minimum wage and, while I got a qualification during my time there, the boss said there was nowhere further for me to go. There was no support and I wasn't going anywhere."

During her search for work Nicole sent out applications every weekday and worked at a nightclub on the weekends working anti-social hours for low pay. While her seven month search for work did see her secure a couple of interviews she struggled to find a job, and was even told by one employer that they received so many applications they ended up throwing many of them away.


While eager to start a career Nicole worried she had left it too late to begin learning something completely new. However after finding out about Get into Car Mechanics at the Jobcentre she jumped at the chance to take part. "I didn't know what the options were but as soon as I heard about Get into Car Mechanics I knew it was what I wanted to do," Nicole said.

"It couldn't have come at a better time. The Prince's Trust has been amazing. I wake up before my alarm, all bright-eyed and bushy-tailed for the job. It doesn't even feel like work.

"The best part about the course was proving that to myself and everybody that doubted me—girls can do it too, it is not just a male dominated environment."

Nicole has secured a four year apprenticeship with Arnold Clark and is optimistic for the future. She added: "I have thought about starting my own business, an all female garage. I might even consider management in the future. It's a huge opportunity at Arnold Clark and an honour to work there."






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

She has spoken on behalf of the Mayor at conferences on reducing the use of illicit tobacco, early intervention on alcohol abuse, reducing obesity and issues surrounding dementia. Victoria has also campaigned for more action to be taken on the issue of FGM across London. Victoria has also been working on the Mayor's Health Commission

Victoria was born in London and has lived and worked here all her life. Married to Jamie, they have four children; Victoria had twenty years in business before going into politics. In her business life she was a Director of Clarion Events, a subsidy of the P&O group. She has been a Kensington and Chelsea Councillor since 2002, and is Chairman of Borough Community Relations. Anna Redwood



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
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
